RESOLUTION 20-12-15-01
CITY OF THORNE BAY

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING AN ALTERNATIVE ALLOCATION METHOD FOR THE FY21 SHARED FISHERIES BUSINESS TAX PROGRAM AND CERTIFYING THAT THIS ALLOCATION METHOD FAIRLY REPRESENTS THE DISTRIBUTION OF SIGNIFICANT EFFECTS OF FISHERIES BUSINESS ACTIVITY INFMA 19: SOUTHERN SOUTHEAST AREA

WHEREAS, AS 29.60.450 requires that for a municipality to participate in the FY 21 Shared Fisheries Business Tax Program, the municipality must demonstrate to the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development that the municipality suffered significant effects during calendar year 2019 from fisheries business activities; and,

WHEREAS, 3 AAC 134.060 provides for the allocation of available program funding to eligible municipalities located within fisheries management areas specified by the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development; and,

WHEREAS, 3 AAC 134.070 provides for the use, at the discretion of the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development, of alternative allocation methods which may be used within fisheries management areas if all eligible municipalities within the area FMA 19: Southern Southeast Area agree to use the method, and the method incorporates some measure of the relative significant effect of fisheries business activity on the respective municipalities in the area; and,

WHEREAS, The City of Thorne Baby proposes to use an alternative allocation method for allocation of FY21 funding available within the FMA 19: Southern Southeast Area in agreement with all other municipalities in this area participating in the FY21 Shared Fisheries Business Tax Program;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Thorne Bay City Council by this resolution certifies that the following alternative allocation method fairly represents the distribution of significant effects during 2019 of fisheries business activity in FMA 19, Southern Southeast:

- All municipalities share equally 50% of allocation; all municipalities share remaining 50% on a per capita basis.
- Ketchikan Gateway Borough population is reduced by the Resolution of the Cities of Ketchikan and Saxman

1) CALL TO ORDER:

Burger called the meeting to order at 6:30p.m.

2) PLEDGE TO FLAG:

The audience and council stood for the pledge to the flag.

5) MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Burger reported on the following:

- Stated that it was very important that people continue to practice proper hygiene, handwashing, keeping social distancing.

6) ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS:

a) City Administrator:

Meetings Attended and Updates:

- I apologize for my absence; I am in a required meeting with the Alaska State Troopers regarding the major vehicle accident on 9/11/20.
- SE Alaska Conference was 9/22/20 to 9/25/20. The biggest topic of the conference was the announcement by Murkowski that Alaska is going to be receiving our own "Roadless Act" amendment, and the legislature is reviewing ALL OPTIONS to increase the resiliency and reliability of the AMHS.

Tasks and Projects:

- The Stryker EMS equipment order is pending a final addition. The EMS Coordinator agreed that a Lucas V3 Automated CPR device would be a good addition to our capabilities. Stryker has added it to our quote. The new quote is for \$77,321.44. The

prior quote was for \$56,436.98 leaving an increase of \$20,884.46. I am seeking council approval to move forward with funding this invoice through the CARES act funding.

- Klawock Invoice vs. Thorne Bay Invoice: The council received an email on 9/23/20 regarding the City of Klawock refusing to pay any funds as outlined in the EMS MoU. There is currently an issue where Klawock is invoicing us for the use of their solid waste facility while our bailer was down, and we are invoicing them for us paying the EMS dispatchers. We have credited their invoice against ours which leaves a balance of \$8,919.94 due to the City of Thorne Bay. Klawock is stating they do not owe it and is refusing to pay it. I am seeking direction from the council as to if they want to move forward with referring the debit to legal counsel and / or collections.

Continuing Business:

- Break in at dump: There was a break in at the Solid Waste Facility. The suspects were seen on video surveillance and we are currently working with the VPSO and Alaska State Troopers to further the investigation. Would the Council want to offer a \$500 Reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspects?

New Business:

- Melody Moen – Tree removal: Melody Moen contacted me regarding removing some trees on the city easement that are blocking their viewshed of the bay. Area 1 and part of Area 2 as indicated on the map below. I explained that AP&T was doing some trimming and removal based on the utility easements and she may want to contact them to see if these trees would be removed. If they are not being removed, and with city council approval, I will work with the Moen family, and assisting with coordination with the US Forrest Service to ensure all legalities are covered. The intended use of the downed trees would be to be cut and placed on the roadside (out of the way of course) and provided, free of charge, to the community for firewood. The fiscal and legal liability of this project will be the responsibility of the Moen Family. I am seeking Council comments and approval to move forward with this item.



Departmental Reports:

Water and Sewer:

Sam and Willy are working to get the sewage treatment plant prepared and ready for the fix being implemented to the UV Sterilizer system. It is being lowered almost 6 feet to allow for our surge flow.

Harbors and Parks:

We are currently recruiting for a Harbor Master. We have 3 applicants at this time.

Streets and Roads:

James Taylor is rapidly approaching his testing date for his Commercial Driver's License and has been practicing a lot lately.

Solid Waste:

Jason Jennings has returned from his time off and is doing an amazing job at the solid waste facility.

Library:

Report from Library Director Laura Clark:

- The Library is open and has added 2 new Volunteers increasing our hours open to serve our community. Many thanks to our new volunteers. We are currently ordering, and new items are now hitting the shelves. Come in for new middle school aged books and all kinds of new movies. Many of our movies are now kept behind the scenes, please ask and we happily share the new titles with you.

“The goals of the Alaska Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) are to provide financial resources to Alaskan communities for public facilities and planning activities which address issues detrimental to the health and safety of local residents and to reduce the costs of essential community services. The program may also fund Special Economic Development activities which result in the creation of jobs for low- and moderate-income persons. CDBG competitive grants are single-purpose project grants;

maximum of \$850,000 per community. There are three basic funding categories: community development, planning and Special Economic Development. CDBG programs utilize the resources of the Community Development Block Grant program funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Approximately \$2 million is available for competitive grants for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 20 grant cycle.”

➤ CITY OF THORNE BAY REPORT

Overall plan for expenditures from CARES:

The Thorne Bay City Council approved changes in the CARES spending plan outlined below:

EMS – \$362,965

Personnel - \$32,465 -costs for new coordinator position and increased stipends for dispatch and EMT’s through Dec. 30, 2020. (Starting Jan 1, the city’s general fund budget will assume these costs.) Coordinator position salary and benefits budgeted for 6 months. Reduce by 2 months (July and Aug.)- savings of \$11,680.

Medical Expenses – \$120,500 restock critical supplies to ensure preparedness for any future surge of the pandemic.

Equipment – \$190,000 Gurneys, ambulances + shipping

Travel and Training – \$15,000 expenses to increase the skills of EMS workers, both paid and un-paid.

Airlift Northwest - \$5,000

Employee wages and grant management – \$61,672

Money to cover employee expenses for work done specifically to alleviate and diminish the pandemic. Grant management dollars, \$24,000, were reduced to \$10,000 as it is anticipated the number of hours first allotted won't be necessary.

Public Health – \$6,222 cleaning supplies, sanitizer stations, re-stock MMRS tent

Grants to small businesses and non-profits - \$35,500.

In the 1st round, the city received 11 applications, so another round was advertised and four more were received.

Utility and Moorage Relief to residents –\$12,500

The city mailed applications to residents and received few returns. A 2nd round was advertised with an Aug. 21 deadline and 4 more applications were received, all of which were funded.

Repair and Expand Davidson Landing Facility (Thorne Bay's south side) - \$70,800
Davidson Landing will be upgraded as an 'incident command center' for south Thorne Bay

Communications – \$24,000 New radios will be purchased to replace old, outdated ones. Tablets will be purchased for council members who must attend meetings virtually.

Food Bank mileage reimbursement for deliveries - \$200
Amount of grant \$573,859.52

7) PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Patrick Tierney Commented on the Following:

- Parking limitations. Encouraged the council to review the plan for parking in Thorne Bay and addressing parking all over Thorne Bay. The proposed limitation of parking on Rainy Lane would prohibit people who visit businesses to park.
- Encouraged the council to take the time, look into the history, look into the facts, look into the realism of what Thorne Bay has available for parking in town, and what we need to deal with going forward.
- Offered to help work on this issue, do and see what I can do to help.

8) COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Eric Rhodes commented on the following:

- Encouraged the public to participate in the Community Development Block Grant Public Hearings. Rhodes explained the importance of having public involvement during the application process.
- Three ways the public can participate and have their voice heard in the CDBG;
 1. Public Hearing October 22ND, via WebEx at 6pm,
 2. Public Hearing October 24th at 2pm in person at the at the Fire Hall across from City Hall, or
 3. Complete the Survey that has been posted around town, on the City website and available at City Hall.
- Explained that the CDBG Grants are based on our score of poverty. It's incredibly

important that we take advantage of the opportunity as we see the Federal and State funding being dried up in some areas, this is still accessible to us.

Burger commented on the following:

- The trees that are being requested for trimming or removal are not on private property and the City should be able to handle internally.

Hert commented on the following:

- Not in favor of removing trees to help someone's view of the bay. Would agree to trim trees, but not to remove them.

Stram commented on the following:

- Commented that if the trees were on the persons property, they could have them removed.

- Read the resignation letter of Councilman Roger Longbotham:
 “Dear City Council Members and Citizens of Thorne Bay,
 I Roger Longbotham am hereby submitting my letter of resignation to be effective October 23rd, 2020 at 12:00PM. The reason for my resignation is I am outside the city of Thorne Bay taking care of my wife's elderly parents. Both are in there middle to upper 80's and are in 2 different locations. With them being married for over 68 years, the separation is difficult at best. We are doing everything we can for them to spend time together as often as possible. With the pandemic and travel restrictions in force, travel back and forth to and from Thorne Bay is very difficult. I don't want to put my family at risk by the extensive travel and extending myself to a higher exposure risk of the COVID 19.

Dear City Council,

After canvassing the neighborhood, I find that there is little, if any support for one-way street designations. One-way streets will cause extended travel routes, confusion and may limit access during emergencies.

Options to consider listed by level of support:

- 1) No Action. Do nothing other than efforts to maintain safe passage along the street.
- 2) Limited or no parking in areas with less than 24 feet useable area within the ROW. Post or otherwise mark areas where there is less than 24 feet of useable right-of-way as no parking. Leave the rest of the street as open parking with NO LIMITS other than the restrictions on abandoned or inoperative vehicles, large vehicles, boats and other prohibited parking.

We seem to be addressing this issue due to a certain few residents who abuse parking privileges and cause congestion. Why should the rest of us suffer because of the sins of the few?

The data presented in my first set of comments bears out the facts that issues with parking are occurring where the street/useable ROW is narrowest.

Use the no parking near fire hydrants and intersections to the advantage. Combined with a very few well-placed and descriptive signs, the situation could be resolved simply.

A few other suggestions for signs:

- 1) Caution Narrow Street
- 2) Caution One Lane Road
- 3) Caution Children At Play
- 4) No Parking This Side of Street (with arrow)
- 5) No Parking Either Side of Street (with arrow)

I do not support one-way street designation nor limitations on parking where there is 24 feet or more useable ROW available.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF THORNE BAY, ALASKA, - AMENDING TITLE 1-GENERAL PROVISIONS; SECTION 1.16.035-MINOR OFFENSE FINE SCHEDULE, AMENDING THE MINOR OFFENSE FINE SCHEDULE FROM "PER OFFENCE" TO A "GRADUATED" FINE SCHEDULE FOR MINOR OFFENSE VIOLATIONS OF THE THORNE BAY MUNICIPAL CODE PROVISIONS ADOPTION BY REFERENCE, SUBSECTION (B)(2) OPERATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF THORNE BAY, ALASKA

Section 1. Classification. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature, the chapter and section hereby amended shall be added to the Thorne Bay Municipal Code.

Section 2. Severability. If any provisions of this ordinance or any application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 3. Amendment of Section. The title and chapters of Title 1 - General Provisions, Chapter 1.16 - General Penalty, Section 1.16.035-Minor Offense Fine Schedule, amending the fine schedule from "per offense" to a "graduated" fine schedule for all minor offense violations of the Thorne Bay Municipal Code. The fines are hereby amended and added to the Thorne Bay Municipal Code.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective upon adoption.

Title 1 General Provisions

Chapter and Sections shall read as follows:

1 . 16.030 VIOLATIONS-SEPARATE OFFENSE.

Every act prohibited by Thorne Bay ordinances is unlawful. Failure to comply with any mandatory requirement of any ordinance is also unlawful. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by a Thorne Bay ordinance for any particular provision or section, each violation of this code is an infraction, punishable by a fine up to three hundred dollars per violation. Each act or violation and every day upon which a violation occurs or continues constitutes a separate offense unless stated otherwise in any ordinance. (Ordinance 18-01-02-01; Prior Ord. 88-23 § 5(part), 1988)

1 . 16.035 MINOR OFFENSE FINE SCHEDULE.

In accordance with as 29.25.070(a), citations for the following offenses may be disposed of as provided in as 12.25.195-.230, without a court appearance, upon payment of the fine amounts listed below plus the state surcharge required by as 12.55.039 and as 29.25.074.

FINES MUST BE PAID TO THE COURT.

If an offense is not listed on a fine schedule, the defendant must appear in court to answer the charges. The Alaska court system's rules of minor offense procedure apply to all offenses listed below. Citations charging these offenses must meet the requirements of minor offense rule 3. If a person charged with one of these offenses appears in court and is found guilty, the penalty imposed for the offense may not exceed the fine amount for that offense listed below.

Section 1. Classification. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature, the chapter and section hereby amended shall be added to the Thorne Bay Municipal Code.

Section 2. Severability. If any provisions of this ordinance or any application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 3. Amendment of Section. The title and chapters of Title 10 – Vehicles and Traffic, Chapter 10.20 – Parking, Standing and Stopping, Section 10.20.020-Parking Prohibited, is hereby amended, and added to the Thorne Bay Municipal Code.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective upon adoption.

CHAPTER 10.20 - PARKING, STANDING AND STOPPING –

10.20.010 RESTRICTIONS AND EXCEPTIONS - AUTHORITY.

The mayor or his/her designee is authorized to determine when and where parking, standing or stopping restrictions or exceptions enumerated in this section are required, or will contribute to the safe and orderly flow of traffic, or will contribute to the efficient use of public streets or public places or property; and to implement such restrictions or exceptions by causing signs to be erected:

- A. To authorize parking on the left-hand side of certain one-way streets where such parking would otherwise be prohibited;
- B. To prohibit parking or standing on the left-hand side of any one-way street. No person shall park or stand a vehicle in violation of such signs;
- C. To prohibit parking upon any street or highway when the width of the roadway does not exceed twenty-four feet, or upon one side of a street or highway as indicated by such signs when the width of the roadway does not exceed thirty-six feet. No person shall park a vehicle in violation of such signs

- D. To prohibit parking upon either or both sides of any street or highway adjacent to any school property when such parking would in his opinion, interfere with traffic or create a hazardous situation. No person shall park a vehicle in violation of such signs;
- E. Limiting the length of time, a vehicle may occupy a parking space. No person shall park a vehicle in violation of such signs;
- F. To prohibit parking, standing, or stopping of vehicles during certain hours of the day or night. No person may park, stand or stop a vehicle in violation of such signs;
- G. To prohibit the parking of any of certain large vehicles such as trailers, travel homes, trucks, etc., on designated streets within the central business district between the hours of six a.m. and eight p.m. No person may park any such vehicle in violation of such signs;
- H. To prohibit parking, standing or stopping where such would create an especially hazardous condition or would cause an unusual delay in traffic. No person may stop, stand or park a vehicle in violation of such signs. (Ord. 18-08-21-02; renumbering of prior section 10.20.070; Prior Ord. 84-03-22-01 § 14, 1984)

10.20.020 PARKING PROHIBITED:

- A. No person shall park a vehicle upon a roadway for the purpose of:
 - 1. Commercial advertising;
 - 2. Displaying such vehicle for sale;
 - 3. Greasing or repairing such vehicle, not necessitated by an emergency;
 - 4. Washing such vehicle when the person so engaged is in the business of washing vehicles. (Ord. 84-03-22-01 § 3, 1984) (Prior Section 10.20.030 (a-d))
- B. No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or traffic control device, in any of the following places and no signs are required: (Prior Section 10.20.040 (a-c))
 - 1. Within ten feet of an intersection;
 - 2. Within fifteen feet of any fire hydrant;
 - 3. Within five feet of a crosswalk, except at an intersection where it shall be ten feet. (Prior Section 10.20.040 (a-c))

- C. No person shall park any vehicle upon a street or highway, other than an alley, in such a manner or under such conditions as to leave available less than ten feet of such roadway for the free movement of vehicular traffic (Prior Section 10.20.010)
- D. No person may remove, obliterate, obscure, cover or move any chalk mark or other mark or indication placed by a police officer or parking enforcement officer upon a tire or any part of a vehicle which is parked in a public parking zone or space; provided such marks or objects may be moved or removed in the process of moving the vehicle from the parking space or after the vehicle has been moved from the space. (Prior Section 10.20.080 (a))
 - 1. A vehicle which has not moved from a parking space shall be deemed to have remained parked or standing in such space until moved. For the purpose of this chapter, a vehicle must vacate the space occupied and be driven completely through a street intersection before it shall be deemed to have been moved from the space. (Prior Section 10.20.080 (b))
 - 2. Each period or part of a period of time a vehicle remains parked or standing beyond that time permitted under this chapter or as posted shall constitute a separate violation, except that each separate day upon which such a continuing violation exist shall be separate violation if the period of permitted parking is twenty-four hours or greater. Only one citation may be issued during each period which constitutes a separate violation. (Prior Section 10.20.080 (c))
 - 3. No overnight camping allowed on City property unless otherwise posted. (Prior Section 10.20.080 (d))
 - 4. No person shall park a vehicle within an alley in the central business traffic district or any business district except for the expeditious loading or unloading of freight or materials and then the vehicle shall be parked in such manner or under such conditions as to leave available not less than ten feet of width of the alley for the free movement of vehicular traffic. (Prior Section 10.20.020)
- E. No person shall leave a disabled or abandoned property on any public street, alley or road for more than forty-eight hours.

F. NO PARKING _____ BEGINNING OCTOBER 1ST
THROUGH APRIL 30TH OF EACH YEAR..

(Prior Section 10.20.050 (a))(Ordinance 18-08-21-02)

10.20.030 OFF-STREET PARKING PLACE – TIME LIMITED PARKING/PERMIT PARKING

Definition. For the purpose of this section,

1. "Public parking spaces" include all city owned lands including roadways and rights-of-ways
 2. "Private parking spaces" include both publicly and privately-owned off-street parking spaces which are reserved for the use of a specific individual or group of individuals or are otherwise restricted when such reservations or restrictions are posted.
 3. "Time limited parking/permit parking" include both publicly and privately-owned off-street parking spaces which are reserved for the use of a specific individual or group of individuals or are otherwise restricted when such reservations or restrictions are posted.
 4. Harbor Parking- Harbor Zone. Loading and unloading, except for the space designed for the harbormaster, handicapped, ATV vehicles or special use vehicles. (Ordinance 18-08-21-02 Ss; 1-4)
- A. Harbor Parking--Permit Required for Over twelve hours. The parking of any vehicle, boat and/or trailer, motorcycle, RV or other at the Main Harbor, boat launch, and Davidson Landing Harbor areas shall be for no longer than twelve hours, unless a monthly parking permit is obtained at city hall. The permit shall be placed in such a position that it is easily viewed through the windshield, or attached in a secure manner to trailers, etc., as long as the permit is easily viewable by city personnel. The billing cycle for permit parking in these areas shall be from the first of each month to the first of the following month, to correspond to the city's billing cycle. The first month's permit fee shall be paid in advance at the time of application plus applicable deposit. If the subsequent invoice is not paid by the due date of the invoice it shall be considered revoked, and the vehicle shall be subject to any applicable provision of the municipal code. All vehicles with no visible way to identify the owner will be marked and impounded after two weeks.
- B. Park and Sell – Permit Required. Permits are sold on a thirty-day period extendable for one additional thirty-day period. Park and Sell is designated to Shoreline Drive across from the Port. The permit shall be placed in such a position that it is easily viewed through the windshield. All vehicles with no visible way to identify the owner will be marked and impounded after two weeks.

- C. Permit Parking - The first month's permit fee shall be paid in advance at the time of application plus applicable deposit. If the subsequent invoice is not paid by the due date of the invoice it shall be considered revoked, and the vehicle shall be subject to any applicable provision of the municipal code. All vehicles with no visible way to identify the owner will be marked and impounded after two weeks.
- D. Parking Permit Billings - All fee structures for Parking Permits will be set by resolution. Parking Permits will continue to be billed to the customer until the permit has been returned and written notification of removal is submitted to the City of Thorne Bay. (Ord. 18-08-21-02; Prior Ord. 03-06-05-02 §3, 2003; Ord. 84-03-22-01 §13, 1984 Ord. 09-01-06-01 ~2009)(Ord. 15-09-01-01 SS: D) (Prior Section 10.20.060)

10 .20.040 PARKING IN EXCESS OF POSTED TIME LIMIT – PERMIT PARKING.

- A. No person in charge of a vehicle shall park or leave such vehicle in a parking space in the herein established parking lots in excess of the posted time limit.
- B. Any owner or operator of a vehicle who parks or leaves such vehicle in a parking space in the herein established time limited parking/permit parking lots in excess of the time permitted is guilty of an infraction and will be punished by the fine established in 1.16.035 if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by the fine established in 1.16.030 if the offense is not listed in the fine schedule. (Ordinance 18-08-21-02)

10 .20.050 EMERGENCY, STREET MAINTENANCE AND SNOW REMOVAL VEHICLES-OBSTRUCTION PROHIBITED.

- A. The mayor or his/her designee shall post signs on any streets where routine repairs are planned. These posted notices shall be in a prominent place and displayed at least eighteen hours before the work is to be performed. This section does not apply to emergency work that may, from time to time, become necessary on any public utility which is accessible from a street, alley or roadway and which work is required without time for planning and notification of the public. (prior section 10.20.050 (d))
- B. No person shall leave any vehicle parked on any public street, alley or road when snow removal or road maintenance activities are planned or are in progress. Any

vehicle that is parked on a public street, alley or road shall be moved by the owner or the owner's representative within four hours after notification by the mayor or the mayor's designated representative.

- C. In the event that the owner of a vehicle, which is parked on a public street, alley or road, is absent from his/her home, does not have a telephone, or lives in a place that is not readily accessible to the mayor, his designee or street maintenance crews, shall notify the city clerk in advance of a person who is available to move such parked vehicle. (Ord. 18-08-21-02, (Part), Prior 84-03-22-01 §12, 1984)

10.20.060 OFF-STREET PARKING PLACE--REMOVAL OF UNAUTHORIZED VEHICLES.

- A. Definition. For the purpose of this section, "private parking spaces" include both publicly and privately-owned off-street parking spaces which are reserved for the use of a specific individual or group of individuals or are otherwise restricted when such reservations or restrictions are posted.
- B. Removal of Unauthorized Vehicles. The rightful owner, lessee or other person authorized to control or use an off-street private parking space may remove an unauthorized vehicle from an off-street private parking space by requesting a towing company authorized by the state of Alaska to conduct towing operations in the city.
- C. The city shall not be liable for any towing, storage or other charges of for the acts of any person taken under the authority of this chapter. (Ord. 18-08-21-02; Prior Ord. 15-09-01-01 SS: D; Prior Ord. 09-01-06-01~2009; Ord. 03-06-05-02 §3, 2003: Ord. 84-03-22-01 §13, 1984)

10.20.080 VIOLATIONS-PENALTIES.

Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in 1.16.035 if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by the fine established in 1.16.030 if the offense is not listed in the fine schedule. (Ordinance 18-08-21-02; Prior Ord. 18-01-02-01; Ord. 84-03-22-01 § 16, 1984)

FINES MUST BE PAID TO THE COURT.

If an offense is not listed on a fine schedule, the defendant must appear in court to answer the charges. The Alaska court system's rules of minor offense procedure apply to all offenses listed below. Citations charging these offenses must meet the requirements of minor offense rule 3. If a person charged with one of these offenses appears in court and is found guilty, the penalty imposed for the offense may not exceed the fine amount for that offense listed below.
